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**INTRODUCTION:** On January 17<sup>th</sup>, Councilmembers Bob Blumenfield and Paul Koretz introduced Council File 18-0054, a motion directing the Chief Legislative Analyst, Chief Administrative Officer, and Personnel Departments to report back within 30 days on the establishment of a Climate Emergency Mobilization Department tasked with planning and coordinating a citywide response to climate change. The Energy, Climate Change & Environmental Justice Committee voted to approve the first moving clause 4-0-1 on April 17<sup>th</sup> and the City Council passed the clause 13-0-2 on April 27<sup>th</sup>. On May 7<sup>th</sup>, the Budget Committee voted 5-0 to earmark \$500,000 in the Unappropriated Balance (UB) to “establish a new Climate Change Emergency Mobilization Program within a new Environmental Affairs Department focused on climate change issues,” with the City Council voting to approve the budget recommendation on May 21<sup>st</sup>.

**JUST TRANSITION:** The motion explicitly requests that the Department operate under the principles of a just transition as the City shifts to a regenerative, renewable energy economy: “The City must therefore aggressively move to reduce and remove greenhouse gas emissions and adapt and restore ecosystems by rapidly adopting legislation to mandate such efforts Citywide and by doing so in such a way that lower-income and frontline communities of color benefit first from mitigation and adaptation funds.”

**RECOMMENDATIONS:** We recommend that the Department’s core focus areas include grant writing, inter-departmental and city-wide coordination, inter-governmental coordination, just transition, and research & strategy. Additionally, we recommend that the inclusion of a commission with a wide range of stakeholders from frontline environmental justice communities, labor unions, business groups, and neighborhood councils.
